
SELF-EMPLOYMENT TRENDS AMONG OLDER AMERICANS: BY GENDER


Self-employment is a prominent form of work among older Americans. But how do self-employment rates vary by gender among people age 50 and older?

Working Rates Among People Over 50:




Over the past dozen years, the share of older men who are working for pay has consistently been about 10% higher than the share of women.

2 Looking at the same time span, the share of older male workers who are self-employed has been about 10% higher than the share of women.

Yet how do these rates differ by age among working older Americans? While the rates of self-employment increase with age among both groups, the rates increase the most dramatically for men: Among workers over the age of 80, the share of men who work for themselves is nearly 20% higher than that of women.

Methodology

Authors' calculations using weighted data to be representative of the U.S. older population from the Health and Retirement Study/RAND HRS Longitudinal File 2016 (V2). The HRS is a longitudinal study sponsored by the National Institute on Aging and the Social Security Administration that surveys a representative sample of approximately 20,000 people in America every two years.
